Yet, even during times of transition, there's work to be done as we look to the future to insure that the mental health needs of our community continue to be met.

Unfortunately, one challenge we face is substance addiction, which negatively impacts the lives of so many individuals, families and communities. The ADAMhs Board has always been committed to addressing this major public health issue, and during fiscal year 2019 applied for and was awarded funding through the Ohio Mental Health and Addiction Service's 21st Century CURES Act (CURES2) program, and the Addiction Treatment Program (ATP). This funding allowed the Board to successfully partner with the specialty docket courts in Fulton, Henry and Williams counties, along with our area drug and alcohol treatment providers; A Renewed Mind and Recovery Services of Northwest Ohio. Through this collaborative effort, the ADAMhs Board was able to insure that individuals and families suffering with substance use disorders had access to high quality, effective treatment and supports.

As CEO, I'm proud of the accomplishments that we've made during FY 2019, and look forward to continuing to improve and expand our delivery system to meet the mental health needs of our communities.
