

Board Initiatives

2022 was both exciting and challenging for the Four County ADAMhs Board. While the COVID-19 pandemic waned, its impact forever changed the landscape of behavioral healthcare in our counties. The broadening of ODMH rules governing telehealth outpatient and crisis mental health services was a welcome change, while others like a growing workforce shortage presented difficulties.

To meet the growing need for services while continuing to provide high-quality mental healthcare to our communities, the ADAMhs Board applied for and received the Ohio State Opioid Response (SOR) grant. Through SOR dollars, the Board funded improvements to local facilities and increased support for treatment and prevention services. The ADAMhs Board also worked to alleviate some of the immediate impacts of our area workforce issues, by updating and expanding the technology used to provide local telehealth services. This investment in technology will improve the efficiency of our system and improve access to mental health and addiction treatment in our area.

As CEO, I'm proud of the work that we have done to improve and maintain our network of care. I'm confident that these investments in our system will have a positive impact on the wellbeing of our communities, now and in the future. I look forward to leading the Four County ADAMhs Board into 2023 and appreciate your on-going support.
