The Four County ADAMhs Board

The Four County Board of Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services (ADAMhs) of Defiance, Fulton, Henry and Williams Counties was created in 1978 to ensure the availability of communitybased alcohol, drug addiction and mental health services. It was established by Ohio statute for the purpose of planning, funding, monitoring and evaluating contracted mental health, alcohol and drug treatment services to our residents. The ADAMhs Board does not directly provide services, but contracts with a network of public and private health care agencies to care for persons in need.

Mission Statement

To ensure the availability of an effective integrated behavioral healthcare system through planning, monitoring, funding and evaluation.

Vision Statement

The Four County Alcohol, Drug Addiction and Mental Health Services Board will ensure an innovative, efficient, and effective delivery system to address the prevention, treatment, and recovery needs of individuals and families affected by alcohol, drugs, and mental illness.

ADAMhs Board Members

During FY 2025, the Four County ADAMhs Board experienced growth in personnel. Lisa Jones joined our team in April as the new Project Manager. Tim Livengood and Tim Meister both became Board members representing Williams County. 2025 also marked a milestone for the Board as Sandi Weirauch retired after serving as an Advocate on the Board for 20 years, she will be missed.

The Board met early in 2025 and completed the new Strategic Plan for 2025-2029. As we reviewed our previous Strategic Plans, we realized that over time, our values, Mission and Vision Statements have evolved. Changes were made to reflect the growth the Board has experienced, then goals and action steps were identified and clearly defined. The new Strategic Plan will serve as our road map moving forward for the next 5 years.

We partnered with New Home Development for their Capital Project Upton II. Upton II will offer supportive, monitored housing services for individuals recovering from co-occurring mental health and substance use diagnoses who are at risk for homelessness. A Few Board Initiatives...

The Center for Grief and Healing

Recovery Services of Northwest Ohio now offers specialized, focused care for people experiencing grief. The Four County ADAMhs Board helps fund the specialized, companion model training for clinicians to offer grief, and traumatic grief services.

The Four County LOSS Team

The LOSS team responds to the scene or the home of new survivors to offer resources and support after a death by suicide. The Four County LOSS Team has been responding to suicide deaths in our area since 2015 and is one of the few teams nationally who still respond in person at the time of the death.

Suicide Grief Support Group

The journey through suicide loss can feel isolating, many people have found hope and healing with the support of other loss survivors. The Suicide Grief Support Group meets twice a month and is open to anyone who has lost a loved one to suicide.

Transportation

A lack of dependable transportation can be a barrier to accessing recovery supports within the community for people living with a substance use disorder or mental health diagnosis. The ADAMhs Board helps support transportation for individuals engaged in services through Board affiliated providers.


The mission of the Four County Suicide Prevention Coalition is to increase awareness, decrease stigma, and increase people's ability to seek help aimed at suicide prevention.
